- The SKCGS Traveling Library is at each general meeting. Members can check out books for one month. The Traveling Library is open one hour prior to the general meeting.


The SKCGS Research Library is maintained at the Auburn Public Library, 1102 Auburn Way South, Auburn. Books kept at Auburn are for use in the library only.

## LIBRARY NEWS

Katie Hanzeli and Jan Emerson have been helping me select about 10-12 shelves of books to be kept available at the temporary Auburn Library location for the coming year. We have kept most all of the "how-to" books, all the SKCGS publications and a variety of other more general genealogy books. Since this coming year is the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the War of 1812, we kept out the small number of books we had on subject that at the request of Eastside GS. Since we've just had the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of the Civil War, we've kept out our books on that topic as well.

Included are these three books: Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska Civil War Veterans: Compilation of the Death Rolls of the Depts. Of Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska, Grand Army of the Republic, 1883-1948; Indiana Civil War Veterans: Transcription of the Death Rolls of the Department of Indiana, G.A.R., 1882-1948; and Grand Army of the Republic, Dept. of Illinois: Transcription of the Death Rolls, 1879-1947. The vertical file will be in storage during the library closure. There will only be one or two boxes for exchange newsletters, so only the most recent one or two issues of each title will be kept and available, so if there are any items of interest you better get to the temporary library quickly to see them.

We'll include a final list of the books available in the temporary library in the next newsletter.

#### **Passive Research Pays Off**

Assertive research has always been my primary focus of family history research, but I am so glad I heeded the advice of sharing so that others could find me and help collaborate. When my Swede-Finn grandparents immigrated to the U.S. to settle on the Iron Range in northern Minnesota they renounced their homeland. Fortunately my father had keen ears and wrote down names and dates as they slipped out from time to time as his parents could not be engaged in conversations about the old country.

He had the names and birth dates of all his aunts and uncles, but no information on his cousins. He knew that one aunt married a JOHNSON and another married a NELSON and they lived in Chicago.! Fortunately my aunts' maiden names were not quite so common. In 2009 I used FamilySearch and found the database of Cook County Illinois Vital Records. I found a record of a child b. 1891 whose mother's maiden name matched my aunt's – Maria Karolina Nissen and the father was a Charles Johnson. With this info I found the 1900 census records of the family which contained more information.

I went to the JOHNSON surname Message Boards at Ancestry.com and GenForum to post a message with this subject line: Charles & Maria Karolina [Nissen] Johnson parents of Hulda, Oscar, Jalmer, Anna - Chicago, IL early 1900's. The message contained the information I had gathered and ended with "I have much of her ancestry. I am hoping to find her descendants or others connected to her family."

I also decided to update my family history project that I had posted to RootsWeb WorldConnect. I also posted the transcription of a 1907 letter that my father's older sister, my Aunt Sig, saved and sent to me in 1985. This 1907 letter was from a cousin in Australia to my grandmother in Biwabik, Minnesota. This letter was a treasure!

It told news of his family (Alex Snellman) and then news of a John Johnson family which had me stumped.

In Nov. 2010, I received the following e-mail:

"Hi Charlotte,

I thought I would google one of my ancestor's name and came up with your link on Rootsweb - Char's Family History Project.

The link I believe we share is an Anna Greta Johans-dtr ID-I3049 who died on the 1 April 1904, and had

a son Johan Emil born 2 August 1861. Must go and study your tree a little further to try and fill in some blanks.

Look forward to hearing from you. Amazing where our ancestors lead us.....

Regards,

Michelle Bowden"

I replied immediately! And so did Michelle. Since then Michelle and I have traded photos, documents and stories; she sharing the Australian side and I, the American side of my great-grandmother's posterity.

Then in Dec 2010 at the very end of the year, I received a reply to my Aug 2009 post on the JOHN-SON message board. Karyl Mose and I have discovered that her great-grandmother and my grandfather are siblings! She also has an interested cousin, Sue Crawford, and the 3 of us are now collaborating on fleshing out the American posterity of our Swede-Finn roots. This is so exciting!

Do not count on passive research as the way to accomplish your family history project. It's the assertive research that yields the steady accomplishments, but taking time to plant the seeds of passive research by posting information and encouraging replies can have big pay-offs.

#### Google Gets AROUND

I recently started playing around with one of Google's lesser-known features, the AROUND proximity operator. Google's AROUND syntax lets you specify how close you want two terms to appear in a web site. This can be particularly useful if you are looking for two topics that may often appear on the same page but not in relation to each other.

Your options for multiple-word searches are usually to look for web pages that contain both words anywhere on the page or either word on the page, or to restrict the search to pages in which the two words are adjacent. Now you can also specify that two words or phrases must be no more than, say, 5 words apart. The syntax is search-word AROUND(x) search-word - replacing "x" with the maximum number of words you want between the two search terms or phrases. (Be sure you type AROUND in all caps; otherwise, Google treats it as just another search term.)

How does this work in real life? I was recently working on a project analyzing the impact on the workplace of the arrival of digital natives (those who have grown up with digital technology). A search for "digital natives" workplace turned up useful information, but I had to wade through a fair amount of irrelevant material in which the phrase digital natives and the word workplace both appeared, but not in the appropriate context. When I changed my search to "digital natives" AROUND(6) workplace, the results were more focused on what I had in mind. The difference wasn't dramatic but the results were definitely better.

For straightforward, just-get-me-the-answer searches, the AROUND feature probably will not improve your search results noticeably. The query ipad review returns roughly the same number of useful results as the query ipad AROUND(4) review, for example. Since Google factors in the proximity of search terms in calculating the relevance of each page, most of the top results will naturally have your search terms relatively close to each other. The value of AROUND emerges when you are looking for the intersection of two concepts that do not frequently appear near each other.

#### **News from Exchange Newsletters**



History buffs and genealogists, among other hobbyists, recommend using Google Books and the Internet Archive to search for and download books that

are out of copyright and in the public domain. A good strategy to employ is to play each site off the other, for this reason: what you don't find on one you may find on the other. I experimented with this recently. Years ago my local librarian was able to get a microfiche copy for me from the New York State Library in Albany of The Jones Family of Long Island: Descendants of Major Thomas Jones (1665-1726) and Allied Families that was originally published in 1907. The book verified for me what my deceased father had told me many years ago: that one of my ancestors had married into the Jones family. I first looked for it at <a href="http://">http://</a>

books.google.com and it appeared in the hit list. But Google did not make it available for download as a PDF file or offer it online. Instead, Google had links to sites that sell it, and it's not inexpensive. I tried <a href="www.archive.org">www.archive.org</a> next, and as I expected, I was able to download it for free as a PDF file. Google Books and the Internet Archive are both very valuable tools for finding family histories, city guides, city directories, almanacs, and other fascinating books and materials that you can download to your computer and read at your leisure. Don't assume that if Google Books doesn't have what you want that the Internet Archive won't have it either. Try both sites. (Westchester Co. GS Newsletter, Feb 2011)

Dick Eastman reported on January 27<sup>th</sup> that Google and Yad Vashem have begun digitizing the Holocaust museum's extensive collection of materials. Right now users can access 130,000 photographs from Yad Vashem's photo collection by going to <a href="http://collections.yadvashem.org/photosarchive/enus/photos.html">http://collections.yadvashem.org/photosarchive/enus/photos.html</a>. (Ibid.)

Dick Eastman raves about BackupMyTree.com in his January 14, 2011 newsletter as an ingenious way to preserve your genealogy files that are on your computer. Best of all, it is free. Eastman says, "BackupMyTree automatically finds and backs up industry standard GEDCOM files as well as data files created by Family Tree Maker, Personal Ancestral File, Legacy Family Tree, RootsMagic (version 4 or later), Family Tree Builder, Family Tree Legends, Ancestral Quest, Ancestry Family Tree, Reunion for Mac, and GenoPro. Note the inclusion of Reunion for Macintosh. The rest are all Windows programs." (Ibid.)

Dick Eastman and the New England Historic Genealogical Society have recently been talking up the merits of a new search engine devoted exclusively to genealogy called Mocavo.com. Michael Leclerc of NEHGS says, "Mocavo.com is the world's largest free genealogy search engine. It provides access to free genealogy content on the web. Mocavo indexes publicly accessible websites and sends searchers directly to the sites. It is a great way to do one-stop searching of websites like the Internet Archives, Find a Grave, state archives and historical societies, Ellis Island and more. The best thing about Mocavo is that it specifically targets genealogical websites, automatically removing extraneous results (like Facebook pages, etc.) that appear in Google searches. This function is extremely helpful, especially when researching a very common name. For the best results, put names in quotes. Mocavo will automatically search for instances of firstname, lastname; lastname, firstname; and even firstname middlename lastname. You can do "or" searches (looking for this or that) by utilizing the pipe symbol |. The | is above the Enter key on an American computer keyboard (it can look like two vertical dashes on the keyboard). Similarly, you can omit certain words by using the minus sign (or dash). (Ibid, Apr 2011)

Rhode Island Genealogists on Danish Television's Who Do You Think You Are?: Danish Broadcasting Company's recently aired Who Do You Think You Are? With Danish celebrity Anne Marie Helger, featured the work of two Rhode Island genealogists, Cherry Fletcher Bamberg and Shellee Morehead. Cherry Fletcher Bamberg, a fellow of the American Society of Genealogists and editor of the Rhode Island Genealogical Society's quarterly magazine Rhode Island Roots, and Shellee Morehead, PhD, a professional genealogist specializing in RI and Italian immigrant family history, researched Ms. Helger's immigrant relatives in Boston and Providence. Dr. Morehead was involved in the filming this summer, when the Who Do You Think You Are? Crew from Denmark and Miss Helger were in the U.S. She appears in segments filmed at the Rhode Island School of Design and the Old North Burial Ground, in Providence, describing the lives of Otto Sonne, his wife Harriet Rothe and their children. Time Line on Google: Did you know you can do a timeline of anything you're searching for? Here is

the way it works: Put something in the Google search box – a name, an item, a place, etc. Select "Search," then, on the left hand side, click "show search tools" and "Timeline" will display. Once the results display, you can select the year range of your timeline. (Ibid, Mar-Apr 2011)

"Who Do You Think You Are?", the NBC genealogy program now in its second season, has been renewed for a third season. Comments on the Internet indicate that it is a very popular program, but people want to see how the research is actually done, not just scenes of the celebrities sitting in archives for their "photo ops." Will NBC listen to their viewers? Stay tuned. (Westchester Co. GS Newsletter, Mar 2011)

Dick Eastman posted this article on March 3, 2011 on his online newsletter about more Irish records being put online:

"Ireland's archive collections have found a new central home online at: http://

www.nationalarchives.ie/ The web site launched today and allows the public to search a wide range of Irish archives online. Some of the collections featured include the Irish Film Archive, the Guinness family archives, archives from UCC's Boole Library and a large number of city and county council archives.

The Irish Archives Resource site brings together a large number of collections from around the country, preserved by a range of organizations. It includes records from current and defunct government and local government agencies, personal contributions, estate records, clubs, societies, trade unions, religious, cultural, sporting and political organizations' links to wherever these archives are digitized and searchable online. One notable collection includes deeds on properties in Cork city dating back to the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries.

The same web site also carries detailed descriptions of what is in every archive listed and where it can be accessed physically, if the collection is not online. The important thing about the site is that every collection on it is accessible and available to the public. The long-term hope is that it will one day all be digitized, and some archives are going in that direction already. Limerick city archives have been digitizing a lot of their material already." (Ibid.)

Since 2006 the Washington State Society U.S.D. (U.S. Daughters) 1812 has been working on a project to commemorate the upcoming Bicentennial of the War of 1812. Washington was not a part of the U.S. during that was and there are no battle

sites to mark here. However with the opening of the Oregon Trail and the establishment of Washington Territory, a number of Veterans of the War of 1812 came west to settle new lands and eventually died here. Some of their graves have been lost to time, so the U.S.D. 1812 decided to erect a central monument honoring these 1812 veterans. To date the following have been verified: Butler Emery Marble; Hutson Martin; Peter J. Stice, Sr.; Squire Bozorth, Sr.; Abel Ostarnder; Walter Crockett; Jacob Neff Ebey; Asa Coombs; John Denny; Henry Harmon; Levi Gates; Turner R. Roundtree; William M. Stewart; George Washington Bush; Jeremiah Mabie; and William Rutledge (more data on each in newsletter). The monument is to be placed in Evergreen-Washelli Cemetery in Seattle and dedicated on June 23, 2012. The event will be open to the public. The U.S.D. 1812 is looking for descendants to invite and to recognize at the ceremony. To date they have collected about half of the needed \$3,500 for the monument and ceremony.
